Methodology

The survey was conducted online and achieved a sample of n=845 Rugby Union fans who live in Australia. This means that topline results will have a maximum margin of error of +/- 3.4%. Please note that sub-groups will have significantly larger margins of error.

The survey length was approximately 10 minutes with fieldwork conducted in December 2023. All survey results were anonymous.

Invitations were sent to Rugby Union clubs, specialist Union fans notice boards, social media groups and to nationally representative panels of Australian residents, in order to identify those fans less likely to be part of a club or social group.

Those who were not interested in Rugby Union, or lived abroad, were considered ineligible and screened out of the survey.

Executive Summary


Here are a selection of key findings the report identifies:


- 1. Almost two-thirds of Rugby Union fans (61%) say that the sport is heading in the wrong direction right now.
- 2. More than **two-thirds of Rugby Union fans** (69%) **say that Rugby Australia is doing a poor job right now**, with many lacking confidence that the organisation understands how to get the game back on track (45%).
- 3. The overwhelming majority of Rugby Union fans say they are **dissatisfied** with the current development of the grassroots systems (71%), clearly choosing to prioritise growth of the grassroots game over 'recruiting talent from other sporting codes' (87%) and 'ensuring that the Wallabies win more games (67%).
- 4. More than one-quarter of Rugby Union fans in Australia (28%) support a national team other than the Wallabies, with around one in five (21%) identifying as supporters of the All Blacks.
- 5. Many Rugby Union fans are also **highly engaged with other sports such as cricket** (47%) **and rugby league** (41%), with a significant proportion also saying that they regularly watch these sports.
- 6. An overwhelming majority of Union fans support the exits of both Hamish McLennan (71%) and Eddie Jones (68%).
- 7. Approximately three-quarters of fans (76%) agree that the **next Wallabies Head Coach should be given until after the next Rugby World Cup to show results**.
- 8. Four fifths of **Rugby Union fans** (81%) want to see to see more fixtures.
- 9. Although almost half of Rugby Union fans (47%) believe things will begin improve for Australian rugby over the next 12 months, many remain pessimistic about the Wallabies chances against the British & Irish Lions 2025. Two-thirds (65%) believe that the Wallabies will lose the series.
- 10. There is **overwhelming support for better retention of school-aged talent to continue playing Rugby Union** (71%) and a majority support lowering the tackle height to below the sternum (50%).






Rugby Union Fans – Audience Profile









Income Profile


Average Australian Household Income


Average Rugby Union Fan Household Income

Country of Birth









Many Rugby Union fans take an interest in other sports, and almost half are active fans of Cricket and Rugby League

More than one quarter of Union fans in Australia are supporters of other national teams, one in five support the All Blacks


Q. Earlier, you said were a fan of RUGBY UNION Which of the following Rugby Union teams, if any, would you describe yourself as a fan of? Select all that apply






4 in five Union fans say they watch the sport regularly, while 4 in ten also watch Cricket, and one third also watch Rugby League

Q. Which of the following reasons (if any), which prevents you from watching more Australian rugby union? Select all that apply






About 6 in ten Rugby Union fans think the sport is heading in the wrong direction right now

Rugby WA, ACTRU, QRU and Rugby Victoria are most likely to be seen as doing a good job. A clear majority of fans say Rugby Australia, McLennan, and Jones have done a bad job recently

Concerns from fans tend to centre around lacklustre grassroots and professional development pathways, an unengaging format, and no clear plan to grow the game

'A lack of focus on grassroots development, [and] poor pathways to the professional game....'

'Continuing with a professional system that does not generate public interest or develop players.'

- Aged 16-24, fan of the Wallabies and the Queensland Reds.

'The game has become so boring compared to the NRL'

- Aged 35-44, fan of the ACT Brumbies

'A lack of strategic direction to consolidate the base and grow the sport.'

– Aged 35-44, fan of the Wallabies and the NSW Waratahs.




Rugby Union Fans: Feedback on key issues in the sport.



Rugby Union fans strongly support the exits of McLennan and Jones, and are highly dissatisfied with RA's grassroots development record, and recent performance of the Wallabies


Q. Do you agree, or disagree, with the following statements?








Q. Do you agree, or disagree, with the following statements?





A clear majority of Rugby Union fans hold Hamish McLennan and Eddie Jones responsible for recent World Cup performance of the Wallabies






Q. To what extent, if at all, do you consider Hamish McLennan responsible for the Wallabies' 2023 Rugby World Cup performance? &

Q. To what extent, if at all, do you consider Eddie Jones responsible for the Wallabies' 2023 Rugby World Cup performance?




Rugby Union fans strongly support paid contracts to prevent school-aged talent leaving the code for the NRL

Q. Do you support or oppose the following initiatives for grassroots rugby union in Australia?



There is strong support among rugby union fans (71%) to retain toplevel talent by signing school aged players on exclusive and paid contracts to counter the appeal of switching codes to the NRL.


Furthermore, on the issue of tackle height, while a majority of fans support reforms to the lower it to below the sternum (50%), support increases significantly, by 11pts (to 61%), when fans are reminded of the safety benefits to players – namely: minimized concussion risks.






The overwhelming majority of Rugby Union fans want more professional fixtures added to the fixtures calendar


Q. Should there be more, or fewer, professional fixtures, such as Super Rugby, in Australia?

Q. If you had to choose, what should Rugby Australia prioritise most?








Fans who feel Union is heading in the wrong are significantly more likely to say RA should prioritise the grassroots game over Wallabies winning more games

Those who say that Rugby Union is heading in the wrong direction (approx. 61% of fans) significantly more likely to support growing the grassroots game (75%), over ensuring the Wallabies win more games.


In contrast, fans who think the game is heading in the right direction (approx. 33% of fans) are more likely to say that Rugby Australia should prioritise ensuring that the Wallabies win more games (43%).






Almost half of fans believe the game will be in a better position in 12 months time

Two-thirds of those who say Union is heading in the wrong direction believe the sport will be in the same (32%), or a worse position (32%) in 12 months time


Q. In your view will Rugby Union in Australia be in a better position, worse position, or about the same position in 12 months' time?






Two-thirds of Union fans believe the Wallabies will lose the series against the British & Irish Lions in 2025

Conclusion

We hope you have found our **State of Rugby Union**: 2024 report interesting.

Rugby Union fans in Australia clearly believe the sport has been heading in the wrong direction at this time. Feedback on the Wallabies, Rugby Australia, Eddie Jones, and Hamish McLennan has been poor from fans, prompting cynicism about the future, particularly on the performance of the Wallabies.

Despite this pessimism, there is some hope that Union might be turning a corner in Australia. Fans are eager for more professional fixtures and want to see more initiatives put forward by Rugby Australia to better develop grassroots talent and develop the grassroots game, even if it came the expense of the performance of the national team in the near term.
